Wanted: New Blood Donors Like You

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. Each patient is someone's **daughter**, like Aria, 6, whose 40 transfusions kept her alive during a three-year leukemia battle; or someone's **father**, like Dan, who needed 121 units of blood to survive a serious car accident; or a **mom** like Taylor, who lost 60% of her blood from childbirth complications but is alive today thanks to blood donors.

Patients need someone like **you**, a person willing to take a mere hour out of their day to perform the ultimate good deed by donating blood.

Males between 16 and 22: You must be at least 5' tall and weigh at least 110 pounds.

10 Kid-Friendly Volunteer Ideas for Families

Volunteering teaches kids the importance of giving back to their communities. It also helps them grow as people, build strong self-esteem, develop social and life skills, and show appreciation. Families can use these kid-friendly volunteer ideas to encourage their children to make a difference in their community and help them cultivate compassion, empathy, and a passion for helping others.



1. **Clean up the neighborhood.** Grab a trash bag and some rubber gloves and pick up trash and litter and items that can be recycled. Get other families involved to build connections and community pride.
2. **Get moving for a good cause.** Participate in events like 5K runs or fun runs that donate funds raised to a local charity that's near and dear to your child's heart.
3. **Collect items for a homeless shelter or food bank.** Find out their biggest needs, and design flyers to hang up at school and hand out to neighbors that explain how to donate to help neighbors in need.
4. **Don't forget the animals.** Organize a collection of pet supplies to support an animal rescue. Look into what types of items rescues need. Then ask family members, your school, neighbors, and friends to help out.
5. **Hold a lemonade stand.** Volunteerism and an entrepreneurial spirit come together when kids hold a lemonade stand in the summer—or sell baked goods and hot chocolate in the winter. Pick a charity and donate a portion of the proceeds to it.
6. **Decorate paper lunch bags or placemats.** Senior communities love donations of items like lunch bags or placemats. Encourage your child to get creative with designs as

they learn how important it is to support our “grandfriends.”

7. **Give back to those who support the community.** Hand out cookies or water bottles to mail carriers, delivery people, and trash collectors to show appreciation. Deliver a meal or treats to the local firehouse or police station to thank them.
8. **Donate books to a little library.** Many communities have little libraries where people can borrow books to read. Have your child select some books they're willing to donate so another kid can enjoy them.
9. **Help a neighbor.** Older kids can help neighbors mow their lawns or weed in the spring and summer, rake leaves in the fall, and shovel snow in the winter. Giving back on a personal level helps them build relationships and see firsthand the impact they're having on their community.
10. **Go beyond volunteering.** Beyond traditional volunteer opportunities, consider taking your child on a field trip to expose them to important social issues.

Keep the momentum going and set volunteer goals to keep kids excited about their next opportunity to make a difference. By trying out different types of volunteer ideas, they will learn what they're most passionate about.

Informe a los PADRES

10 ideas de voluntariado para niños y sus familias

El voluntariado enseña a los niños la importancia de retribuir a sus comunidades. También les ayuda a crecer como personas, a desarrollar una fuerte autoestima, a desarrollar habilidades sociales y de vida, y a mostrar aprecio. Las familias pueden usar estas ideas de voluntariado para niños para alentar a sus hijos a marcar la diferencia en su comunidad y ayudarlos a cultivar la compasión, la empatía y la pasión por ayudar a los demás.



1. **Limpie el vecindario.** Tome una bolsa de basura y unos guantes de goma y recoja la basura y los artículos que se pueden reciclar. Involucre a otras familias para crear conexiones y orgullo comunitario.
2. **Muévase por una buena causa.** Participe en eventos como carreras 5K o carreras divertidas que donen los fondos recaudados a una organización benéfica local cercana y apreciada por su hijo.
3. **Recolecte artículos para un refugio para personas sin hogar o un banco de alimentos.** Averigüe cuáles son sus mayores necesidades y diseñe folletos para colgar en la escuela y entregar a los vecinos, donde se explique cómo donar para ayudar a otros vecinos con mayores necesidades.
4. **No se olvide de los animales.** Organice una recolección de artículos para mascotas para apoyar el rescate de animales. Averigüe qué tipos de artículos necesitan los rescatistas. Luego pida ayuda a familiares, su escuela, vecinos y amigos.
5. **Ponga un puesto de limonada.** El voluntariado y el espíritu emprendedor se unen cuando los niños ponen un puesto de limonada en verano, o venden productos horneados y chocolate caliente en invierno. Elija una organización benéfica y done una parte de los ingresos.
6. **Decore bolsas de papel para el almuerzo o manteles.** A las comunidades de personas mayores les encantan las donaciones de artículos como bolsas para el almuerzo o manteles. Anime a sus hijos a ser creativos con

los diseños mientras aprenden lo importante que es apoyar a nuestros “abuelos amigos”.

7. **Retribuya a aquellos que apoyan a la comunidad.** Entregue galletas o botellas de agua a carteros, repartidores y recolectores de basura para demostrar su agradecimiento. Entregue una comida o un obsequio en la estación de bomberos local o en el cuartel de policía para agradecerles.
8. **Done libros a una pequeña biblioteca.** Muchas comunidades tienen pocas bibliotecas donde la gente puede pedir prestados libros para leer. Haga que su hijo seleccione algunos libros que esté dispuesto a donar para que otro niño pueda disfrutarlos.
9. **Ayude a un vecino.** Los niños mayores pueden ayudar a los vecinos a cortar el césped o la maleza en primavera y verano, recoger hojas en otoño y barrer nieve en invierno. Retribuir a nivel personal les ayuda a construir relaciones y ver de primera mano el impacto que están teniendo en su comunidad.
10. **Vaya más allá del voluntariado.** Más allá de las oportunidades de voluntariado tradicionales, considere llevar a sus hijos a una excursión para exponerlos a problemas sociales importantes.

Mantenga el impulso y establezca objetivos de voluntariado para mantener a los niños entusiasmados con su próxima oportunidad de marcar la diferencia. Al probar diferentes tipos de ideas de voluntariado, aprenderán lo que más les apasiona.

Dear Entiat Families and Community Members,

Are you reading this on May Day? You know, if only we lived in Estonia, we'd have Monday, May 1st off. That's because May Day, also known as "Spring Day," is a national holiday in Estonia that celebrates the arrival of spring. No matter whether we have the day off or not, I am sure the majority of us are celebrating the arrival of Spring. It was a fairly long winter, but I see the snow levels receding which is nice, as now snow shovels are traded in for mowers.

A similar word, "Mayday," takes on an entirely different meaning. It indicates distress and often signals an emergency situation. As I think about this, it brings to mind a couple things that happened during the month of April. On April 12th, I was one of 35 superintendents across the state who received a threatening email indicating bombs were placed around our school. That certainly triggered a "mayday" feeling for me. The message was emailed to each of the 35 superintendents at the same time. I immediately contacted Chelan County sheriff's department. Virtually every superintendent also contacted their county sheriff's department. Though Chelan County determined this to be a hoax and advised that we did not need to evacuate or shelter in place, we still took extra precautions. We had maintenance staff walk our school grounds to check for anything out of the ordinary and requested that 2 Chelan County deputies check our campus. This hoax, known as "swatting," is becoming more prevalent and may likely happen again. The safety of our staff, students and visitors on our campus is our absolute priority. We will take every threat seriously and act accordingly. We will also do our best to inform our parents and community as soon as possible.



I do want to give you a heads up. Beginning with our July newsletter, we will be going digital. Our June newsletter will be the last edition that we will send out in the mail. It has become too costly, especially in terms of time, to print out 1200+ hard copies and get them in the mail. It also ties up our copy machines for our staff. The newsletter will continue to be produced and available in digital form. More information to come.

We are winding down and the end of the school year is coming fast. Stay up to date and keep up with the great things happening in our schools. Dear Entiat Families and Community Members,

Spring has finally arrived! Our students and staff are thankful for the warmer Spring weather and have been very busy planning field trips, culminating projects, and preparing for State assessments and end of the year testing. I am so proud of our teachers and students with all they have accomplished so far this year!

As many of you know, it has been a year of growing pains as our school population continues to increase. Our school has grown by nearly 70 students since the start of the school year, with more than half entering at our elementary and about 30 students at our MS/HS. This has presented a challenge in some areas of our building for space, need for additional staff and program support. Although the rapid growth has been a strain on our system in many ways, the Entiat Team (District Office, maintenance, and teachers, to our support team and PTO) rose to the occasion to ensure our growing community remains safe, welcoming, and family focused. You will hear more from us in the coming months on our growth and how we respond to needs.

K-9 Partnership -Chelan County Sheriff's Office

Over the last month, you have received information regarding the K-9 Partnership between Entiat School District and Chelan County Sheriff's Office. This partnership has been established to provide prevention and intervention programs to our students and school. It is the priority of Entiat School Board and Administration to keep the Entiat school community safe and drug-free.

On April 14th, Deputy Jacob Lewis, K-9 Kait, Sheriff Morrison, and School Resource Officer Nigel Hunter visited our building for a sweep of the Middle School and High School. They visited locker rooms, hallway lockers, and classrooms. A handful of bags were identified and screened, and all families were contacted in regards to those bags. Overall, it was a very positive and successful screening process. Entiat students handled themselves amazingly and report to be disappointed they weren't allowed to pet K-9 Kait.

Part of this partnership allows Chelan County to visit us in the future. We are currently working on a Middle School and High School Assembly that will inform our students about the field of public service the job of the K-9 team, and provide an opportunity to ask questions. We are looking forward further collaboration between our two entities.

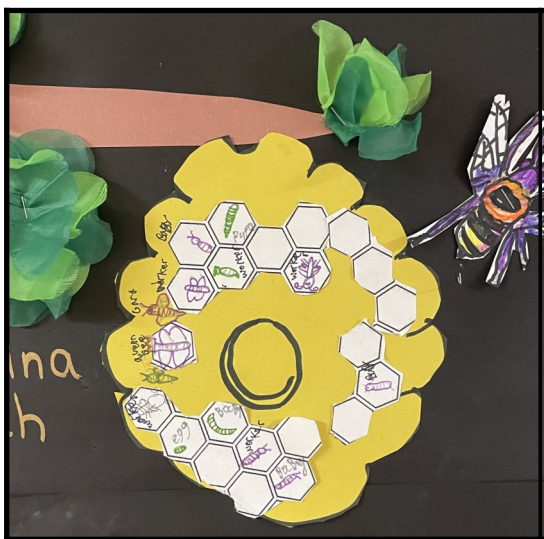
Parent and Family Engagement

Happy spring everyone!

I wanted to share an exciting opportunity coming up for our students! On June 2nd all students aged 12-24 have an opportunity for a complete cardiac screening provided by the Nick of Time Foundation free of charge. This program has found cardiac abnormalities in 20-25% of students they have screened. The screening will be on June 2nd at Chelan High School. All students who return a completed consent form and health history form will be taken to the event. Students will have their vitals taken and recorded. They will then move to the next station where they will learn CPR. All students will then receive a free 12 lead EKG which will be reviewed by cardiologists specializing in pediatrics on site. If an abnormality is found the student will receive an echocardiogram which will once again be reviewed. If an abnormality is found the cardiologists will call home to discuss with parents. No student will be denied care due to inability to pay. To attend this event, students must return a completed consent form to the school nurse. Consent forms can be picked up in the office. 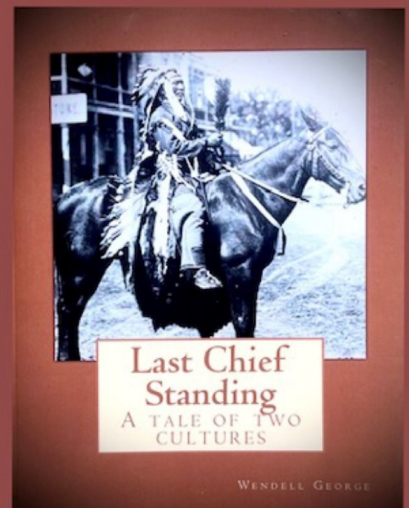
